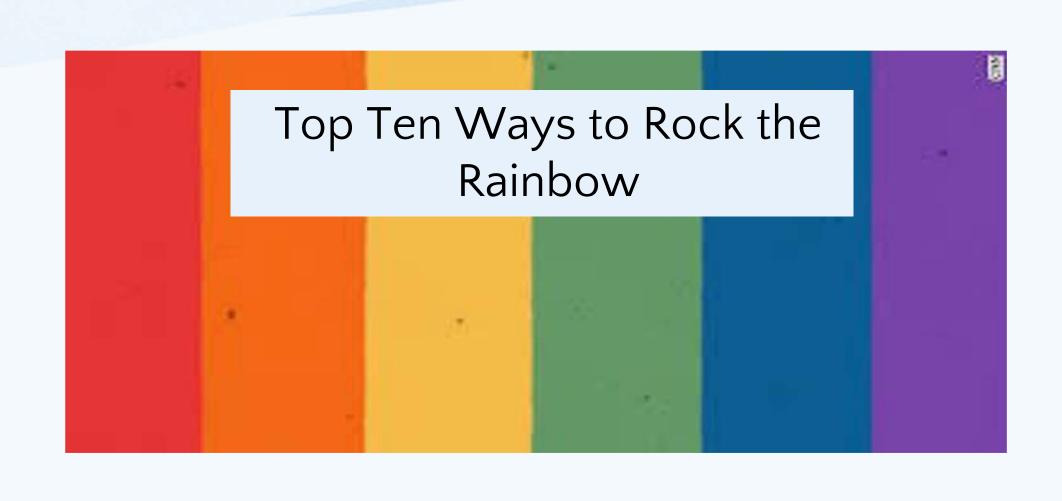

Safe Spaces Agreement

Purpose: to create an atmosphere of safety for all

- 1) There are no stupid questions as long as they're respectful
- 2) Right to pass
- 3) Confidentiality

#9 Never "out" someone without their permission



#9 Never out someone without their permission

- Coming out is often gradual and is always very brave
- Folks will often come out to people with whom they feel safe
- Coming out is a lifelong experience because people are assumed to be "heterosexual/cisgender until proven otherwise"
- When in doubt, ask the person in confidence if they are comfortable with you sharing their sexual/gender identity with others

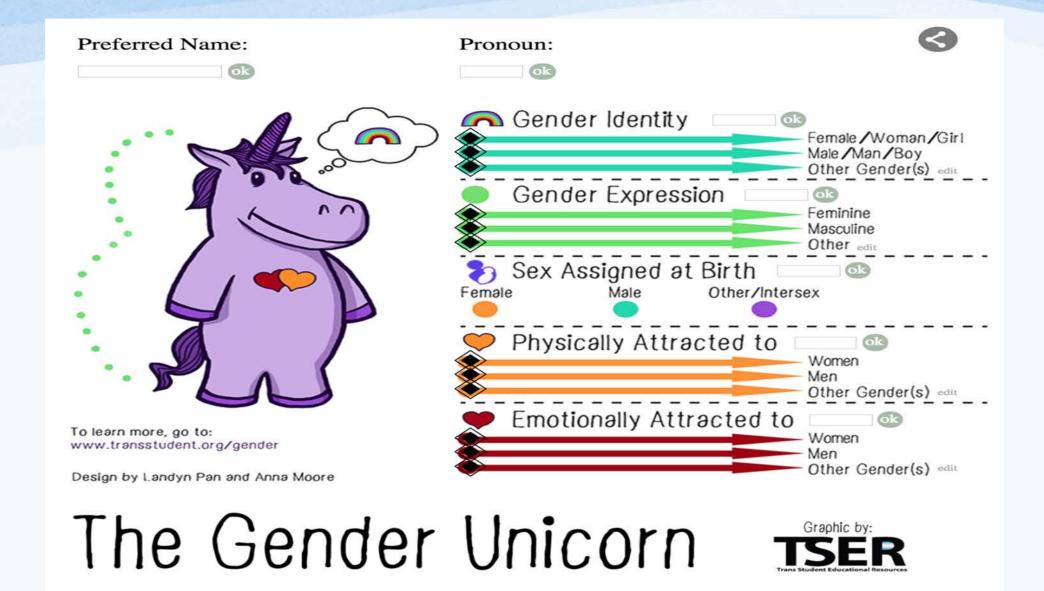

#8 Check any hetero-normative assumptions

Don't make assumptions about anyone's sexual identity

- A person could be questioning their sexuality
- A person who identifies as pansexual could be married to someone of another gender but still identify as pansexual
- A person could display stereotypical female or male characteristics, but not identify as heterosexual (or queer!)
- A person may have multiple partners (polyamorous)



#7 Check any cis-normative assumptions and pronouns



#7 Check any cis-normative assumptions and pronouns

- Never make assumptions about someone's gender or pronoun. For example:
 - A person could identify as trans or be in the process of transitioning
 - An individual might not identify by any gender identity
 - A person may identify with more than one gender
 - A person might be cisgender and not have a "typical" gender presentation

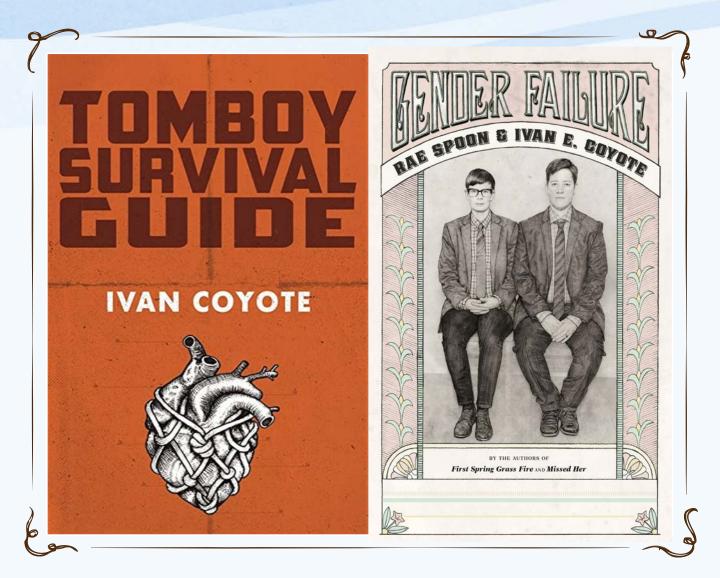






#6 Provide inclusive washrooms

- There can be a tremendous amount of stress for people who identify as trans or non-binary when they use the public washroom
- Micro to macro aggressions are not uncommon for trans or nonbinary people in gendered washrooms
- All-gender washrooms provide peace and privacy for everyone

#5 Make earnest attempts to change non-inclusive words and behaviour

 Repeated apologies for mistakes like using incorrect pronouns becomes "sorry but not really" if behaviour doesn't change over time #4 Remember that safety is in the eye of the beholder...

(not the person who puts the rainbow sticker on the door)

#3 Provide queer competency training for staff































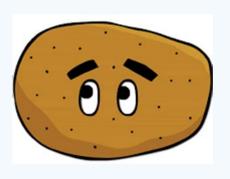


#3 Provide queer competency training for all staff

- Training all staff on inclusive language and approaches provides a consistently inclusive experience for both staff and service recipients
- If someone on staff is an expert on inclusion/facilitation, ask if they would like to do the training

#2 Don't assume a carrot knows what it's like to be celery, even though they're both vegetables



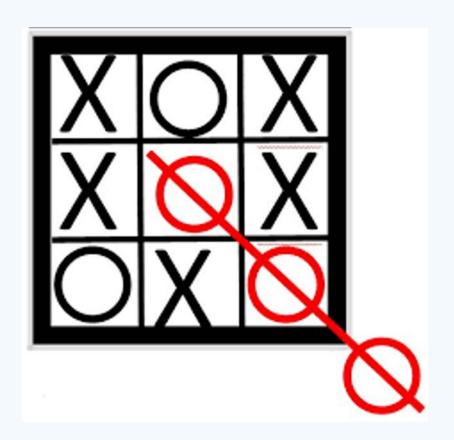




#2 Don't assume a carrot knows what it's like to be celery, even though they're both vegetab<u>les</u>

- People are only experts on their own experience, not all people who identify "under the rainbow"
- For example:
 - Someone who identifies as lesbian has no greater chance of understanding the experience of being trans than anyone else
 - Someone who identifies as trans may not understand the experience of being gender fluid
 - A queer person in a monogamous dynamic may not have any idea how polyamorous relationships work
